# BEST REASONS TO VISIT SALTILLO



## **HISTORICAL RELEVANCE**

Saltillo is the oldest city in northeastern Mexico and southern Texas.

The Villa of Santiago of Saltillo was founded around 1573 and served as a gateway for the founding of towns and villas towards the north of Mexico and the United States. In Saltillo, you'll find traces of history that shaped northeastern Mexico.

Its downtown area is rich in history and architecture.

Saltillo's historical wealth is reflected in its traditions and beautiful downtown. You'll find buildings of great importance such as the Cathedral of Santiago, considered one of the tallest and most beautiful in the country; and a downtown that preserves colonial, neoclassical, and modern architecture.

## **MUSEUMS**

Saltillo takes pride in its rich cultural heritage and offers visitors countless opportunities to learn about the region's history, art, and traditions.

The city is home to over 20 museums, most of them located downtown and housed in architectural gems.

## **GASTRONOMY**

Saltillo is a city for food lovers. Its cuisine features fresh meats, fine cuts, goat (cabrito), and veal. Flour tortillas, machaca, sábanas norteñas (northern-style beef sheets), discada (mixed meats), chorizo, and cheeses are just some of the things you can find on Saltillo's dinner tables. The famous traditional pulque bread is also a beloved part of the city's rich culinary heritage.

## **WINE TOURISM**

In recent years, Coahuila has become a premier destination for wine and vineyard tourism. Saltillo, the state capital located in the southeastern region, is surrounded by top-tier vineyards and wineries. This makes Saltillo the perfect starting point for wine tourism: vineyard tours, wine tastings, and learning all about wine culture. Throughout the year, the city

also hosts important regional wine festivals.

With the “Vinos y Dinos” (Wine and Dinos) route, you’ll enjoy a unique experience that fuses the region’s rich paleontological legacy with its wine tradition. Taste fine wine while learning about the fascinating paleontological discoveries made in our lands.

## **WEATHER**

Saltillo is known for its pleasant weather. The climate is mild, semi-arid, and features a unique combination of moderate temperatures throughout most of the year: low humidity, scarce rainfall, and abundant sunshine. The average annual temperature ranges between 18°C and 20°C (64°F to 68°F), making it ideal for outdoor activities. The seasons are clearly defined, so you can truly enjoy spring, summer, autumn, and winter.

## **PALEONTOLOGICAL RICHNESS**

Saltillo is the capital of Coahuila, a state officially recognized as the “Land of dinosaurs” due to the significant number of paleontological discoveries in its territory. Saltillo is home to the Museo del Desierto (Desert Museum), a major tourist attraction where you can admire dinosaur fossils from the Cretaceous period. Saltillo’s surrounding areas also feature sites with fascinating dinosaurs and marine life discoveries dating back over 60 million years.

## **NATURE**

Saltillo is surrounded by mountains, and their proximity is a great advantage. Within just a 15-minute drive, you can immerse yourself in semi-desert forests and pine woodlands.

The nearby Sierra de Zapalinamé, Saltillo’s main green area and protected zone, offers many opportunities for ecotourism, and you can explore places like the San

Lorenzo Canyon, where you can enjoy guided hikes, bird watching, stargazing, and adventure tourism activities such as rock climbing, spelunking, and rappelling.

# HOW TO GET TO SALTILLO?

You can get to Saltillo by land. Saltillo is in the northern part of the country, in the southeastern region of the state. Saltillo's road infrastructure allows it to stay connected with the rest of the country and the southern United States, having access to the main free and toll roads. The city is connected by Federal Highway 57, which runs through most of the country going from south to north, as well as Highway 40, which crosses the country from east to west.

# SALTILLO'S CULTURE

Saltillo's locals come from a mixed heritage, formed by the blending of Spanish, Tlaxcaltec, and Guachichil peoples.

Before it was colonized, the region was inhabited by native groups known as the Guachichil, who, with the arrival of Spanish colonizers around 1573, retreated into the mountains and were eventually driven to extinction. Later, in 1591, the Tlaxcaltecs arrived, aiding the Spanish in strengthening the northern population and imbued the territory with their culture and ways of living.

We, the people of Saltillo, are the result of a cultural fusion from communities that were once divided in the past, now woven together into a rich and diverse tapestry that defines who we are and makes us unique.

Saltillo's sarape, pulque bread, cuisine, and other traditional elements constitute evidence of this cultural diversity that proudly represents Saltillo's people today.

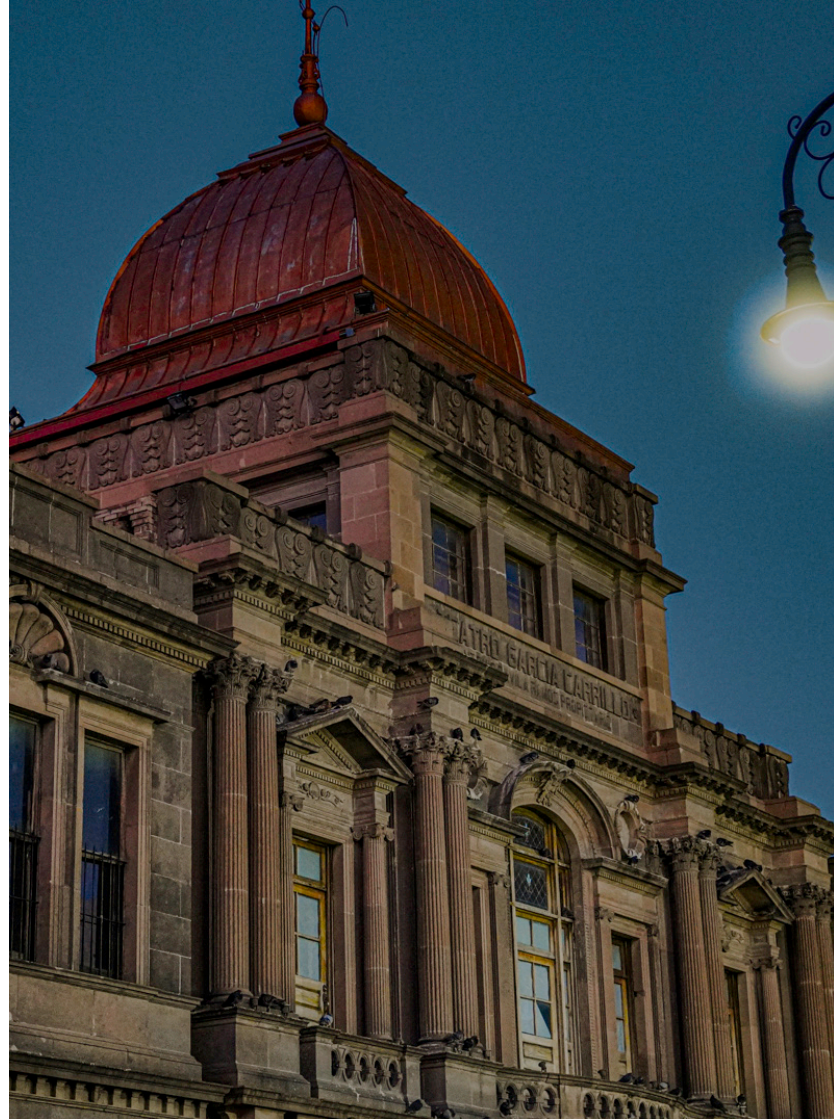
## HISTORIC DOWNTOWN

An architectural work in the style of traditional Irish mansions, now a cultural center featuring spaces for temporary contemporary art exhibitions.

The former theater is now a cultural center with a gallery for temporary exhibitions. It also features an auditorium where conferences, concerts, and readings take place.

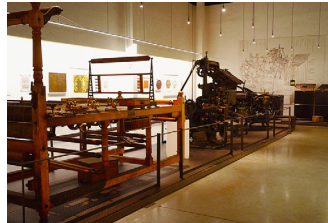

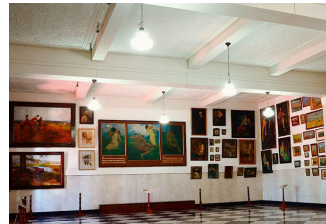

### MUSEO DEL DESIERTO

The Museum of the Desert tells the story of life in the desert, the formation of these landscapes, and the various species that have inhabited this region of Coahuila. It is the largest museum in Coahuila and one of the best natural history museums in Latin America. It features an important collection of dinosaur fossils found in the region, such as Tyrannosaurus Rex and mammoths. The museum also includes several pavilions showcasing human history, as well as a live animal exhibit with species native to the region, including snakes, coyotes, felines, and even black bears and prairie dogs.

### MUSEO DE LAS AVES DE MEXICO



The mission of this museum is to promote and preserve the knowledge, appreciation, and conservation of Mexican birds and their habitat. Inside, it features more than 3,000 specimens of Mexican birds, representing 73% of all bird species found in the country. One of the museum's most unique and charming

features is that guided tours are led by children, giving the experience a special touch.

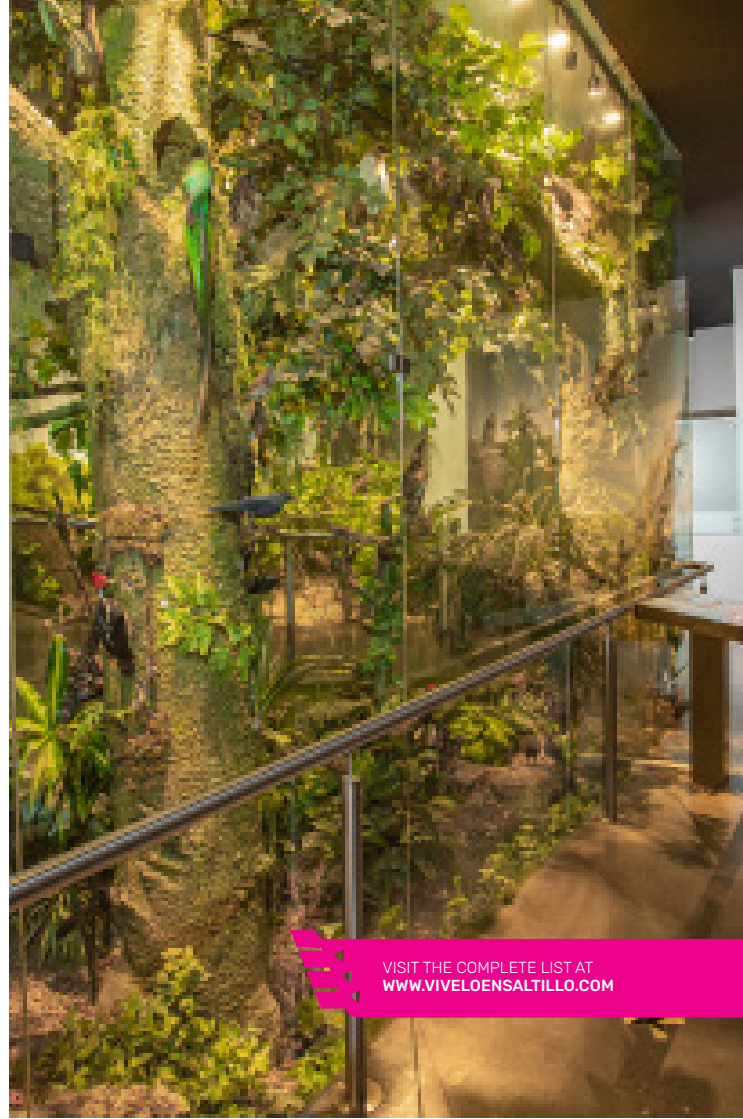

You'll find the city's oldest temples downtown; they stand out for their beautiful architecture and history. Visit them!

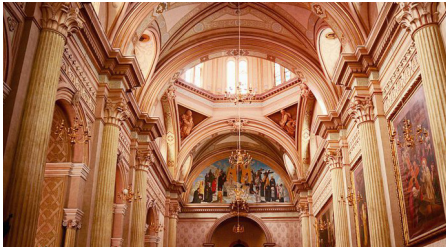
## CATEDRAL DE SANTIAGO

A true architectural gem dedicated to the Apostle Saint James the Greater, its construction began in 1745 as a parish church and, in 1891, it was established as the Cathedral of Saltillo. It blends various architectural styles, including Baroque and Churrigueresque. It is the most iconic building in Saltillo, with one of the tallest towers in Latin America. Inside, its altarpieces stand out, along with a valuable collection of 45 colonial-era oil paintings and the silver frontal on the altar of Saint Joseph — an 18th-century piece that was part of the renowned exhibition “Mexico: Splendors of Thirty Centuries”, which toured the U.S. and Mexico for three years.

## SAN JUAN NEPOMUCENO



A Jesuit temple built in the 19th century. Its Neoclassical façade is marked by its unfinished towers and beautiful dome with stained-glass windows. Inside, it houses oil paintings by Father Gonzalo Carrasco, evangelical sculptures, and a mural depicting the life of Saint John.

## OJO DE AGUA



It was here, more than 400 years ago, that Saltillo was born. The church still retains its atrium in honor of the Ojo de Agua (Eye of Water), where the Villa of Saltillo was founded in 1577, along with its small spring. Devout locals come to worship Christ, while tourists visit for its architecture and historical value, as the Ojo de Agua neighborhood still preserves many aspects of colonial settlements.

## SAN ESTEBAN



This temple, of great historical value, was built in 1592 with the founding of the town of San Esteban de la Nueva Tlaxcala, inhabited by the Tlaxcaltecs. Additionally, in 1847, during the Battle of La Angostura, it served as a hospital.

## SANTUARIO DE GUADALUPE

Built in 1890 in Gothic style with quarry stone, this sanctuary stands out in the city. At that time, the sanctuary belonged to the town of San Esteban de la Nueva Tlaxcala. At the upper and central part of the structure, there is a clock, pointed arch windows, and buttresses, all characteristic elements of the Gothic style that arrived in Mexico after the reign of Emperor Maximilian.

# PARKS AND PLAZAS

Saltillo has beautiful parks and plazas, some historical and some modern, but without a doubt they're great places to walk and have a relaxing and fun day.

## ALAMEDA

The Central Park of Saltillo spans 4 hectares of nature and history. It is connected by beautiful walkways shaded by walnut, poplar, ash, and pine trees. In 1918, the famous Lago República was constructed, surrounded by planters shaped like our country. Its wide corridors serve as a living gallery commemorating significant events in the history of our state. Among its lush corners, you can admire the statue of Zaragoza, the bust of Carranza, the image of Hidalgo, the Central Library of Alameda, the Column of Independence, and a children's recreational space. A perfect refuge for recreational, sporting, and cultural activities.

## PARQUE MIRADOR SALTILLO

A family-friendly tourist attraction located at the highest point of the city, offering an amazing panoramic view of the surrounding area. It is also historically significant, as this site was where the U.S. army camped during the Battle of La Angostura against the Mexican troops.

The park is named in honor of the Army and its commitment to society.

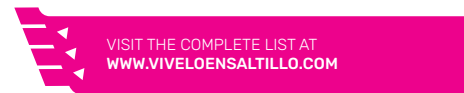

## RELIGIOUS TOURISM

### HOLLY WEEK

Experience religious tourism in Saltillo. The Ojo de Agua magical neighborhood holds a live performance of Stations of the Cross, the oldest in the region with almost 50 years of tradition.

The Procession of Silence is another tradition held every year in different churches downtown. You can attend them at various times and see them join at various points downtown.



### DESERT FAIR

In your visit to Saltillo you can't miss the Museo del Desierto (Desert Museum), which prepares its traditional Desert Fair each year during the Holy Week, where family activities are held, such as paleontology and cactus workshops for children, dance and music performances, and the participation of local merchants and artisans. .

### SUMMER

During summer Saltillo celebrates the city's anniversary. During the months of July and August, cultural, religious, and sporting activities take place, all of them centered around our city's most deeply rooted traditions.

### DAY OF THE DEAD

Saltillo is filled with mysticism in October and November with the Day of the Dead celebrations. Don't miss the Spirit festival, which takes place in our city.

## CUAUHTEMOC EJIDO (RURAL COMMUNITY)

Within the Sierra de Zapalinamé, you'll find an area very close to the city that offers a recreational area for sports, and nature and adventure tourism: the San Lorenzo Canyon. ## WINE TOURISM

Saltillo is surrounded by high-quality vineyards and wineries. If you're in Saltillo, don't miss the opportunity to visit vineyards, participate in wine tastings, and learn all about wine culture. Several regionally important wine festivals are also held throughout the year.

## PULQUE BREAD

Pulque is a typical Mexican beverage obtained from the fermentation of maguey water, in Mexico's pre-hispanic origins it was used as a sacred beverage. Beginning in the colonial era, pulque was used as a leavening agent for breadmaking, and the Tlaxcalans passed the tradition on to Saltillo. Since then, the pulque bread tradition has endured, the recipe was passed down from generation to generation, eventually falling into the hands of a few Saltillo families who jealously guard the recipe and continue to make the bread, which is even exported to other countries.
